President's Column

This is a very busy time of year, with a lot of activities both in the hobby and with the club. With the flea markets of Marlboro and Framingham a recent memory, many people were chasing Titanic special event stations. I hope you had fun and successfully made the QSO. I found my QSL card from WOS, a Titanic special event station, from last year, the 99th anniversary of the sinking. I haven't (yet) made any similar contact this year. I may have missed my chance.

There were a lot of people at the K1P special event station run by PART. This event was held at the Concord Rod and Gun Club, the same place where Field Day will be held. I believe we had 8 different operators and a few different people logging on the computer. Band conditions were quite challenging, but we still made 100 QSOs on the first day. Operators were Anita (AB1QB), Fred (AB1OC), Andy (KB1OIQ), Geoff (KB1USE), Bob (KB1SWZ), Lawton (KG1M), Jon (N1ILZ), and Joe (KB1SSA). Thank you for your participation!

On the second day, Geoff (KB1USE) showed us how it is done by singlehandedly making about 55 QSOs, many of which were DX stations on 17m. He was working some serious pileups! I suppose writing "op age 14" on the post on DXSummit didn't hurt matters (would I do that?!). Next time you see Geoff (KB1USE), ask him which two stations were "the best" in terms of DX. One of those contacts caused a small cheer from the crowd of onlookers.

Andy (KB1WSS) got to run the logging computer and it was his first time watching folks operate a special event station. He was quite excited to hear DX stations, perhaps for his first time on amateur radio as a new licensee.

Bob (KB1SWZ) made several K1P contacts on the AO-27 satellite, one with Titanic special event station WOS! Several other people came to absorb the social atmosphere. We had great weather and K1P was a wonderful excuse to get out of the house and avoid yard work.

In total, we made about 208 phone QSOs for K1P. There were no CW QSOs made from K1P this year. We ran one station during this event. All logs have been submitted to LoTW and eQSL. We also have quite a few K1P QSL cards left over from last year for those who request them.

At the next club meeting on Tuesday, April 17th, Mauri Niininen (AG1LE) will give PART a talk about Software Defined Radio. Field Day Chairman Bob (W1IS) will talk about the upcoming activities for June 23-24, 2012. At Field Day, there will be some new surprises and challenges to keep you on your toes, so please don't miss the meeting. There are also a few volunteer positions to be filled for Field Day.

Keep in mind that the 15th annual CQ Worldwide Foxhunting Weekend is coming on May 12-13, 2012.

PART Field Day!

What is Field Day?

In my opinion, Field Day is the ultimate Ham Radio experience encompassing most every aspect of our hobby including; location, power, antennas, operating, message handling, learning from each other, camaraderie and team work. You can also check out different gear and get opinions from others. Finally, my favorite, you can learn how to operate CW and get your code speed up!

Here is how the ARRL puts it;

"Field Day is a picnic, a campout, practice for emergencies, an informal contest and, most of all, FUN! ARRL Field Day is the single most popular on-the-air event held annually in the US and Canada. On the fourth weekend of June of each year, more than 35,000 radio amateurs gather with their clubs, groups or simply with friends to operate from remote locations."

What is the Object of Field Day?

From the ARRL Field Day Packet "To work as many stations as possible on any and all amateur bands (excluding the 60, 30, 17, and 12- meter bands) and in doing so to learn to operate in abnormal situations in less than optimal conditions. A premium is placed on developing skills to meet the challenges of emergency preparedness as well as to acquaint the general public with the capabilities of Amateur Radio."

Remember that the justification for having the operating privileges we have is based on our capabilities to provide communications in emergencies. Our real value comes when communications infrastructure is inoperable (Cell phones and Most Cell Sites have battery back-up that doesn't last more than a day or so) and we are required to operate under less than ideal conditions.

When is Field Day? (MARK YOU CALENDARS AND ADVISE THE FAMILY.)

"Field Day is always the fourth full weekend of June, beginning at 1800 UTC Saturday and ending at 2100 UTC Sunday. Field Day 2012 will be held June 23-24, 2012.

- 3.1. Class A and B stations that do not begin setting up until 1800 UTC on Saturday may operate the entire 27-hour Field Day period.
- 3.2. Stations who begin setting up before 1800 UTC Saturday may work only 24 consecutive hours, commencing when on-the-air operations begin.
- 3.3. No Class A or B station may begin their set-up earlier than 1800 UTC on the Friday preceding the Field Day period."

I am hoping we have enough operators for continuous operation for these hours: 1400-2400 on Saturday and 0800-1400 on Sunday. We are not planning on graveyard shift operations.

Where is Field Day?

Once again we are very lucky to have the Concord Rod and Gun Club available for Field Day. It is off Strawberry Hill Road in Concord near the Concord Rotary.

What can I do?

You can sign up to help on one of our sub-committees, chair one of the open sub-committees, be part of the set-up and tear down crew, get on the operators and/or loggers list (logging is a good way to learn contest operating, or build up code speed), come to attend one of the tool box sessions or just come for moral support and kibitzing.

Some have suggested we go QRP with Batteries – the bonus for doing either QRP or QRP with Batteries is significant (2X or 5X respectively).

Repeater Information

Repeater Interference

The 146.955 repeater continues to see interference to existing conversations as well as at random quiet times throughout the day and night. The repeater interference committee needs your help in collecting data. If you hear any type of interference, please report the following info to "**repeater**" at "wb1gof.org":



- Time: When did the event happen?
- Observing location: Where were you? Were you mobile?
- Frequency: Input only (146.355 MHz)
- What you heard: Voices, tones, kerchunking or whatever.
- Signal strength: Either by ear (noisy, quiet or full quiet) or S meter
- Radio: To get an idea of the reporter's radio situation.

* Most important - what direction: How did you determine direction? This is the most essential piece of information. Even if it's an estimate as in "Roughly east" or "from the Northeast" it's useful. NEVER EVER reply or direct any thing to the sick person causing the interference. Because some of us have answered this person, he knows we are aware of him and that is what keeps him doing it. Also since you are communicating with a non IDing station you are operating just as illegally as he is. YOU ARE BROADCASTING! NEVER TALK ABOUT INTERFERENCE on air. NEVER

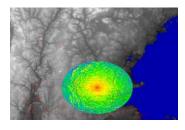
EmComm events and repeater use

Most everyone knows that the 146.955 repeater is used during times of emergency situations, drills and exercises. Skywarn and the monthly EmComm drills are the normal events.

So what does this mean to those that are just looking for regular QSOs with other users? It means that if you are in a regular QSO and there is a significant weather situation that has been getting press/air-time lately, you can expect that if severe weather develops in our area, the folks from Taunton-WX1BOX may interrupt a QSO and ask anyone on frequency what may be happening weather wise. The BOX operator will probably ask for specific information, hail, wind damage, property dame from lightning or wind, etc. Please give him the information he needs or tell him that you've not heard of any such activity. You don't need to tell him it is sunny in Nashua!

There may come a time when an unexpected emergency situation arises. These will significant events that may affect life and property. This is where EmComm activity may step in. Usually an NCS will interrupt a QSO and announce the situation and ask for a QSO to cease or to be "aware" of the possibility of priority calls/traffic. Please make sure you leave breaks between transmissions so stations with traffic can get in between QSOs. If there is enough traffic, it may be necessary for your existing/interrupted QSO QSY to another frequency. You should use your best judgment or check with the NCS on what he feels is best.


EmComm

Emergency Communications – The WB1GOF 146.955 repeater is used on the first Monday of every month (except federal/state holidays) for an EmComm Net starting at 1930 local time. Amateur Radio community to provide situational awareness and disaster intelligence information within your local community via EmComm nets and/or Skywarn stations. Significant events such as widespread power outages can be reported and by agencies such as MEMA to evaluate the scope of a blackout for example. Initially, you should try and contact the EmComm Net Control Stations on the Westford 146.955 repeater to pass this information. More on this new program will be

forthcoming. **PART Sunday Night Net** – The PART Net each Sunday night is an IMPORTANT part of our regional EmComm function. With each station that checks in from the surrounding communities, we test our ability to communicate vital information to the ham radio community. Sure we announce club info but we can also communicate regional disaster news and serve as a "hub" for news of situations in our communities. The repeater is on a generator, so even if we loose power in the region, an HT with a supply of batteries will reconnect you to other local hams.
