D-Star

D-STAR Update

Every once in awhile I get someone that asks me how are the WB1GOF D-Star repeaters doing in terms of activity/usage. I am happy to say that both the UHF and VHF D-Star machines have a lot of activity. There is so much more usage of the UHF frequency than we ever had when it was just plain old FM! D-Star in general continues to grow. The WB1GOF D-Star registration system has 197 unique call signs that have affiliated with it! Our first user (it was NOT me!) registered with us on 4/18/2010 and the most current new user registered on 1/10/2015. Lately we average about 5 new users each month.

As far as activity goes... anyone can see a snapshot of activity by going to the PART website and clicking on the D-Star Status under the WB1GOF repeaters tab. Or click here <u>http://wb1gof.org/F_repeater/dstarstatus/dstar-status.html</u>.

The GOF system is usually connected to a reflector (think conference-node) of other northeast systems on the UHF side and to a wide area reflector on the VHF side. This means that a new user to either repeater able to talk to anyone else within range of a half-dozen or more other repeaters. You will able to see these calls on the link above.



It was a very busy Christmas season with many hams getting new Icom D-Star radios from Santa or E-Bay! The options for RF devices for getting on D-Star are about to get better when Connect Systems Inc. (<u>www.connectsystems.com</u>) releases their new CS7000 software defined, multi-protocol radio. A portable/handheld version will be coming next year as well.

Many, first time D-Star users are getting on the air with a handheld/portable radio. New radio prices are just under \$300, used are as low as \$150.

The latest generation of Icom portables have built-in GPS and a pre-loaded database of D-Star AND analog/FM repeaters with their lat/lon tagged, so you can ask the radio to find the nearest repeater. SLICK!

Even if there is not a D-Star repeater within handheld coverage, there are options to build your own "hotspot". This will enable you to use your radio and connect wirelessly to your own home internet based connection to D-Star. Have a Raspberry Pi, you're almost there! Most of



these hotspot owners are reporting good coverage from their home-based systems and they are usually open for any user within range!

There are lots of full D-Star repeaters and hotspot systems to connect to for RF coverage here in the northeast. The map to the left can be found at

http://status.ircddb.net/qam.php.

Many of these homebrew are opensystem developments adopted after the open source JARL standard. There was a lot of pushback from hams because of the propriety of the codec used in D-Star, but the SDR development efforts will give hams an alternative. Not going to go any further on this topic other than we live our lives every day with proprietary based tools in our hands. A question that also comes up, what about the "other" digital systems like DMR (Digital Mobile Radio and Yeasu's System Fusion. Most of these systems use a newer codec, AMBE+2, like NXDN and IDAS. There are a number of these systems in New England, with the fastest growing segment at the moment in DMR. The DMR radios are all commercial radio like Motorola, Vertex, Tait, Hytera, Kenwood, etc. These radios require unique software to program a "code plug" for the geographical area it is to be used in. They are not "front-programmable" radios that most hams are used to. While capable of having a thousand talkgroups, they have to be pre-defined by the user. You cannot just tune in.

Personally, I have D-Star and DMR radios now... and truly enjoy the flexibility of D-Star.

Cinematic Experience Brings Back Memories for World War 2 Code Breaker:

Watching Benedict Cumberbatch's powerful performance In the Imitation Game has brought back memories of his own wartime code cracking exploits for a Mansfield Woodhouse pensioner. Wilfred Bingley, 92 was part of the team of elite Morse Code breakers who worked for the genius Alan Turing in an operation to crack Nazi codes at Bletchley Park. Wilfred and his daughter Elaine were given free tickets to watch the film when the manager of Mansfield's Odeon Cinema heard he had actually taken part in the operation said to have saved Britain from a Nazi invasion. The film begins in 1939, when the newly created British intelligence agency MI6 recruited Cambridge mathematician Alan Turing played by Benedict Cumberbatch, to crack Nazi codes, including Enigma -- which cryptanalysts had thought unbreakable. Back then Wilfred had just married his sweetheart Barbara when he was called up at the age of 19 for service with the Royal Navy. After showing promise during his training the seaman became a specialist Morse Code reader at a facility in Scarborough.

Storm Spotting Volunteers Serve Important Role In Dangerous Weather:

BLACKSBURG -- When most people tune to the television to learn about severe weather, Carter and Kay Craigie are turning to the skies and their ham radio. And when the weather gets bad, it's information from people like the Craigies that helps put warnings, red bars and loud beeps onto everyone else's TV screens. The Craigies are two of about 2,000 SKYWARN weather spotter volunteers who work with the National Weather Service in Blacksburg. The purpose of their work is to verify and give information to issue warnings and also to stress the danger of weather events to the 40 counties covered by the Blacksburg office of the National Weather Service. "They [spotters] can provide observations about what's happening at ground level, below the radar beam and areas where other tools cannot see," said Phil Hysell, warning coordination meteorologist at the National Weather Service in Blacksburg. "The other role they play is they provide on the ground information that helps notify people that they need to take shelter."

Repeater Information

Repeater Interference

The 146.955 repeater continues to see interference to existing conversations as well as at random quiet times throughout the day and night. The repeater interference committee needs your help in collecting data. If you hear any type of interference, please report the following info to "**repeater**" at "wblgof.org":

- Time: When did the event happen?
- Observing location: Where were you? Were you mobile?
- Frequency: Input only (146.355 MHz)
- What you heard: Voices, tones, kerchunking or whatever.
- Signal strength: Either by ear (noisy, quiet or full quiet) or S meter
- Radio: To get an idea of the reporter's radio situation.

* Most important - what direction: How did you determine direction? This is the most essential piece of information. Even if it's an estimate as in "Roughly east" or "from the Northeast" it's useful. NEVER EVER reply or direct any thing to the sick person causing the interference. Because some of us have answered this person, he knows we are aware of him and that is what keeps him doing it. Also since you are communicating with a non IDing station you are operating just as illegally as he is. YOU ARE BROADCASTING! NEVER TALK ABOUT INTERFERENCE on air. NEVER


EmComm events and repeater use

Most everyone knows that the 146.955 repeater is used during times of emergency situations, drills and exercises. Skywarn and the monthly EmComm drills are the normal events.

So what does this mean to those that are just looking for regular QSOs with other users? It means that if you are in a regular QSO and there is a significant weather situation that has been getting press/air-time lately, you can expect that if severe weather develops in our area, the folks from Taunton-WX1BOX may interrupt a QSO and ask anyone on frequency what may be happening weather wise. The BOX operator will probably ask for specific information, hail, wind damage, property dame from lightning or wind, etc. Please give him the information he needs or tell him that you've not heard of any such activity. You don't need to tell him it is sunny in Nashua!

There may come a time when an unexpected emergency situation arises. These will significant events that may affect life and property. This is where EmComm activity may step in. Usually an NCS will interrupt a QSO and announce the situation and ask for a QSO to cease or to be "aware" of the possibility of priority calls/traffic. Please make sure you leave breaks between transmissions so stations with traffic can get in between QSOs. If there is enough traffic, it may be necessary for your existing/interrupted QSO QSY to another frequency. You should use your best judgment or check with the NCS on what he feels is best.

If you have any questions, please feel free to correspond with either Hugh-N1QGE (Westford EmComm/Skywarn NCS) or Terry-KA8SCP (MEMA Region 1 Communications Officer and Skywarn NCS) . They will be more than happy to talk about these programs with you.

Skywarn - The WB1GOF 146.955 repeater is also used for reporting significant weather events to the National Weather Service from our local spotters. We expect to have a local Skywarn training class in 2010, more information as it becomes available. You can provide valuable information even if you have

not attended one of the training sessions. Listen to the Skywarn Net Control Station for reporting criteria, when you have information that qualifies, please advise him with your report.

Situational Awareness - Recently, the Massachusetts Emergency Management Agency has asked the Amateur Radio community to provide situational awareness and disaster intelligence information within your local community via EmComm nets and/or Skywarn stations. Significant events such as widespread power outages can be reported and by agencies such as MEMA to evaluate the scope of a blackout for example. Initially, you should try and contact the EmComm Net Control Stations on the Westford 146.955 repeater to pass this information. More on this new program will be forthcoming. PART Sunday Night Net - The PART Net each Sunday night is an IMPORTANT part of our regional EmComm function. With each station that checks in from the surrounding communities, we test our ability to communicate vital information to the ham radio community. Sure we announce club info but we can also communicate regional disaster news and serve as a "hub" for news of situations in our communities. The repeater is on a generator, so even if we loose power in the region, an HT with a supply of batteries will reconnect you to other local hams.
